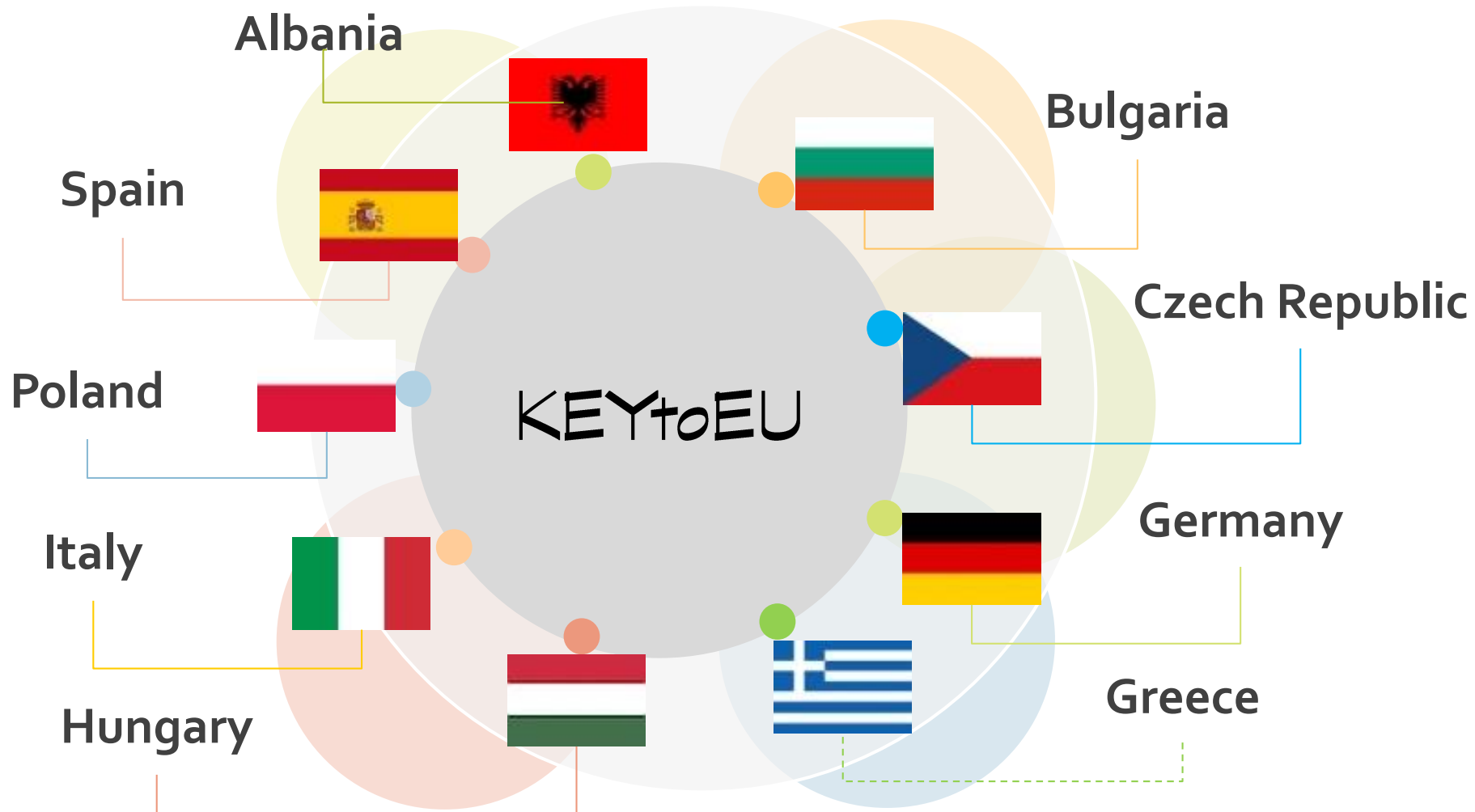


# Solidarity - key to solving social problems and supporting the evolution of Europe in future
